JOURNAL EXCHANGE:

You are all probably aware that there are many crustacean workers in eastern block countries who are interested in participating in the society but who can not readily do so because of currency restrictions. We would like to develop an exchange program to help remedy this. We need society members to come forward and offer to pick up a \$30 foreign membership. We would then link this to a specific colleague in the Soviet Union or other eastern country. That colleague would then subscribe to one of his/her journals (e.g., Doklady Academia Nauk or the Zhurnal Obshchei Biologii) for the western counterpart. Thus, for the price of an extra membership you can help the society financially, get our journal and publications to parts of the world that would normally not receive them, and receive a journal which might not be readily available to you. The foreign publication may also be donated to your own library so that others may benefit from it. A GUIDE TO THE SHRIMPS, PRAWNS, LOBSTERS, AND CRABS OF MALAYSIA AND SINGAPORE, by Donald L. Lovett, 1981. Occasional Publication No. 2, Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Science, Universiti Pertanian Malaysia, 156 pp.

The book includes illustrated keys to all families of Stomatopoda, Mysidacea, Euphausiacea, and Decapoda reported from the area. Keys to most genera are provided. Illustrated keys to the species found in the area are provided for the following groups: Xiphosura, Stomatopoda, Penaeidae (Sicyoninae, Solenocerinae, Aristaeninae), Macrobrachium, Majidae, and Portunidae. the distribution, abundance, habitat, depth ranges, commercial importance, and local common names are provided. This 513 page volume, which includes keys, descriptions, and discussions of approximately 1300 shallow water marine invertebrates from the Sea of Cortez, is lavishly illustrated (340 illus., 243 black and white photos, 31 in color). It contains an extensive bibliography for tropical east Pacific in general, and a scheme of intertidal zonation for the Gulf of California. Univ. of Arizona Press, Tucson, AZ.



Yochelson is serving as President of the group, which is presently based in the National Museum of Natural History, Smithsonian Institution, Washington, DC 20560. Yochelson is hopeful that his organization will serve as the American distributors of th International Code of Zoological Nomenclature which will be published this year. 

Martin Lindsey Christoffersen is currently roonstructing synapomorphy schemes (cladograms) for the caridean shrimps, with initial emphasis of the phylogeny of the Hippolytidae and Alpheidae. He would like to receive world-wide samples (except tropical western Atlantic) of species of the aforementioned families for comparative studies. He would be most appreciative if you can send him preserved samples of common carideans from your region. If you are in doubt as to what to send, consult Holthuis, 1955, Zool. Verh., No. 26:1-157 for a list of genera. He has indicated willingness to provide others with common Crustace from the tropical Brazilian coast, or to identify shrimps of the Alpheoidea.
