BOARD OF GOVERNORS' MEETING

BOARD OF GOVERNORS' MEETING

The Society's Board of Governors met 1 October 1984 at the Bermuda Biological Station. Bill Hart reported that the Society's finances are status quo from last year. According to Arthur Humes, the level of rejection of papers to the Journal is holding steady at 20%, but a backlog of papers is imminent. The Board authorized the editor to increase the number of pages per issue to 180 to offset this problem. Other decisions affecting the journal and the membership include the reduction of print runs to reduce the problem of storing surplus issues, appointment of new members to the editorial board, discouraging the publication of papers involving the description of single new species, reassertion of the requirement that all authors be members of the Society, refusal to accept rebuttal papers unless new data are included, and establishing a position of backup editor. The pro's and con's of holding a meeting at some time other than the last week of December were discussed. The membership will be polled in the near future. The Society will have to cover more of the mailing costs for the newsletter in the near future. The membership list will be shifted to Allen Press, the Journal's publisher. This will facilitate getting printed versions of the list to the membership on a regular basis, as well as improve all future mailings. The Board recognized the NEED TO INCREASE THE SIZE OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS AND TO REASSIGN DUTIES. This will include the creation of several NEW FOREIGN GOVERNORS: one each for ASIA, SOUTH AMERICA, AUSTRALIA/NEW ZEALAND, EUROPE. They will, in combination with their domestic counterparts, be placed in charge of MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT in their respective regions. The terms of the officers and governors will be staggered to permit only one-half of the positions to be elected each year. An award recognizing life-time achievement in carcinology will be established. It will be awarded on a regular basis and will be mediated by a structured committee.

INTERIM SECRETARY AND ECDYSIAST EDITOR

Bruce Felgenhauer at Florida State University will be serving as interim Secretary of the society from 1 March to 1 September while Paul Haefner is in The Netherlands on Sabbattical. Haefner will be conducting research with Dirk Spaargaren at The Netherlands Institute for Sea Research (NIOZ) under the auspices of a Fulbright Award. Following receipt of this newsletter, all correspondence concerning the Ecdysiast as well as any other secretarial business should be directed to Bruce.


THE OUTSTANDING PAPER AWARD

Denton Belk, who chairs the society's committee charged with selecting the annual outstanding paper published in The Journal of Crustacean Biology has provided an outline of the guidelines:

- 1. One paper is to be chosen from among those published in each volume of the Journal of Crustacean Biology.
- 2. All papers published will be considered for the award.
- 3. Members of The Crustacean Society are encouraged to submit letters of recommendation in support of those papers they think merit sepcial consideration by the Awards Committee. These letters should be typed, include a clear citation for the paper recommended and include brief supporting comments; letters should be addressed to: Awards Committee, c/o the Business Office.
- 4. Evaluation of papers for the award will be based upon the following qualities, as judged by an Awards Committee appointed by the President of the Society:
 - a. Originality and innovation in research and presentation of data.
 - b. Contribution of significant theories and/or syntheses to the scientific literature.
 - c. Exemplary technical quality in all aspects of the published paper.
- 5. The Awards Committee shall recommend a paper to be recognized for the award to the Board of Governors of the Society; it shall also make available to the Board a list of all papers recommended by the membership and the number of recommendations that each paper received from the membership. The Awards Committee shall present a brief justification of its recommendation to the Board. The Board of Governors shall make the final determination of the award recipient.
- 6. The award will be presented at the Society's annual meeting held in the year following the year of publication.
- 7. The award shall consist of a certificate for each author and announcement in the Society's Journal.

NEW JOURNAL






AMPHIPOD WORKSHOP

Please do not pay into this account in U.S. dollars, as that is expensive.

COMPUTER CORNER

This year we will intitiate a Computer Corner as a regular feature of the $\underline{Ecdysiast}$. In it we will provide tips on and reviews of software, notes on new books and software, and citations of articles on softward available for scientific writing. We welcome contributions from members.

If you send any information on software, please include such information as price, vendor, copywrite holder, disk size, operating system, and make of machine.

In this column we will focus on two books published recently on free software. The first, How to Get Free Software, by Alfred Glossbrenner (\$14.95, St. Martin's Press, 175 Fifth Ave. New York, NY 10010; available from Crown Books for about \$12.00) is a "Master guide to free programs for every brand of personal or home computer." Much of the information is organized by computer system, and the book includes many money and time saving tips. It also contains inf ormation on using bulletin boards and online services and a list of "gems" of public domain software.

A second book that is also good is <u>The Free Software Handbook: 1984/85 CP/M Edition</u> by T. Gregory Platt, Patricia Law Hatcher, and Blake H. Van Meter (published by People Talk Associates, P.O. Box 863652, Plano, TX 75086). This book provides documentation for 70 public domain programs, including several very useful programs, such as RPIP, which allows you to PIP from one disk to several without resetting your system; DISPLAY, a utility like TYPE that allows you to scroll upward or downward when viewing a file; FIND, which can be used to search very quickly for strings, and NWSP205 (Newsweep), an excellent utility for copying, erasing, squeezing/unsqueezing, etc. This handbook sells for \$17.95 and the programs \$49.95. You will want both.

Members may be interested in <u>Science Software Quarterly</u>, a journal published at the Center for Environmental Studies, Arizona State University, Temple, AZ 85287, is aimed at computer users in the natural sciences. It includes articles on software and applications, reviews, a fleamarket (software listings), and sections on published programs. Annual subscriptions are \$45.00 for individuals, \$25.00 for students, and \$98.00 for institutions. For further information contact Diana J. Gabaldon at the Center for Environmental Studies.



This new edition of the Code, to be published in early 1985, can be ordered through March at the prepublication price of \$18.75 from the American Association for Zoological Nomenclature, c/o NHB Stop 163, Smithsonian Institution, Washington, DC 20560.

The AAZN was formed in 1984 to help raise funds for the work of the Internation Commission on Zoological Nomenclature, which badly needs financial support. It provides a way for American zoologists interested in nomenclature to support directly the work of the Commission through tax-deductible individuals memberships. One of the activities of the AAZN will be to help distribution of the new Code in the United States. Annual dues in the AAZN is \$20.00.
