ANNUAL TCS MEETINGS IN BOSTON

The meetings this year coincided with the 100th Anniversary celebration of the American Society of Zoologists. TCS was active as usual, sponsoring three contributed paper sessions, a poster session, and a symposium (Biology of the Thalassinoidea). The annual TCS Board of Governor's meeting and Business meetings were held, and the minutes will be published in an upcoming issue of JCB.

TCS AWARDS

Congratulations to Roger Griffis (Dept. of Ecology & Evolutionary Biology, UC Irvine): his presentation at the Boston meetings, "Thalassanid shrimp of the Sea of Cortez: morphological and genetic differentiation from Eastern Pacific species," was designated as the TCS Best Student Paper for 1989. The award consists of a free one-year subscription to JCB and a certificate. (Students who wish to compete for the Student Best Paper Award are reminded that ONLY oral presentations are considered; poster presentations ARE NOT eligible for this award.)

Other awards presented at the Boston meeting were the TCS Best Journal (JCB) Paper Awards for volumes 6-7 ("Phylogenetic and phenetic relationships among the lower Decapoda" by Larry Abele and Bruce Felgenhauer) and volumes 7-8 ("Structure of the brain and medulla terminalis of the spiny lobster Panulirus argus and the crayfish Procambarus clarkii, with an emphasis on olfactory centers" by David Blaustein, Charles Derby, Robert Simmons, and Arthur Beall).

TCS TENTH ANNIVERSARY MEETINGS, SAN ANTONIO, 1990: SYMPOSIA

As you are all aware by now, the TCS meetings that will take place in San Antonio next December (with ASZ, as usual) will include the Society's Tenth Anniversary. In addition to the usual array of contributed papers, posters, commemorative t-shirts etc., the two scholary highlights of the meetings will be the symposia that will be co-sponsored by the Society:

History of Carcinology: this symposium, co-sponsored by the ASZ Division of History and Philosophy of Biology, is being organized by Frank Truesdale. The symposium and associated contribued paper session(s) will feature an impressive array of national and international authorities on the history of crustacean research. The symposium will be published in the Crustacean Issues (Balkema Press) symposium volume series. Special thanks are due Frank Truesdale for his efforts—he was approached by Society members to take on this time-consuming task for the TCS tenth anniversary celebration some time ago and graciously volunteered his time and efforts both as organizer and volume editor.

The Compleat Crab: This symposium, co-sponsored by the ASZ Invertebrate Zoology Division, will deal with the physiological ecology of crabs, and it is being organized by Linda Mantel, Tom and Donna Walcott, and Elizabeth Wenner. Publication of symposium papers is planned in JCB.

1990 TCS SAN ANTONIO MEETINGS: FOSSIL EXCURSION

Gail Bishop is planning a potential field trip for the San Antonio meetings which should excite considerable interest. His description of the excursion is as follows:

Fossil Decapod Crustaceans from the Lower Cretaceous Glen Rose Limestone: The carbonate rocks of the Early Cretaceous (Lower Albian) Glen Rose Limestone of Kendall County, Texas have yielded one of the geologically oldest North American decapod crustacean faunas. The fauna consists of 10 decapod species dominated by cheliped disassociation units of the Ghost Shrimp Protocallianassa but including carapace disassociation units of 4 brachyurans and cheliped disassociation units of two others. The fossil decapods are found as disarticulated fragments scattered through 3 m of fine-grained, clayey limestone associated with bivalved molluscs, serpulids worms, and heart urchins, evidence suggesting a nearshore marine habitat for this fauna.

A half-day field excursion will visit a locality described by Bishop (1983) where participants will collect specimens of this Early Cretaceous fauna. A discussion in the field will center around the phylogenetic importance of paleontological data and its limitations.

1989 ELECTION RESULTS

LUMCON 1990 SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM

Summer courses available for credit through Louisiana's state universities are offered at the Louisiana Universities Marine Consortium. The LUMCON Marine Center in Cocodrie is the center for summer program courses, with additional use made of the Port Fourchon Field Laboratory near Grand Isle. Excellent opportunities exist for field work, oceanographic research training cruises, and laboratory experiments in LUMCON's new facility which features a large seawater system. Five-week courses to be taught in the summer of 1990 are Introduction to Marine Science, Marine Ecology, Marine Invertebrate Zoology, and Marine Science for Teachers. In addition, shorter, one or two-week courses will be carried under Topics in Marine Science, specifically in Wetland Vegetation, Wetland Loss, Mariculture Sediment Geochemistry, and Louisiana Coastal Field Geology. Directed undergraduate or graduate research and study are available by arrangement with a member of the senior scientific staff. 1992 SUMMER MEETING OF THE CRUSTACEAN SOCIETY


TENTH ANNIVERSARY SOUVENIR ANNOUNCEMENT


