

The organizing committee, headed by Chu Ka Hou, has worked tirelessly to put together a packed academic program with six plenary speakers. In addition, the organizers have arranged four special excursions to the Mai Po Nature Reserve (Hong Kong's "Bird Paradise"), Hoi Ha Wan Marine Park, Ocean Park Hong Kong and Hong Kong's UNESCO Global Geopark. I hope to see some of you in Austin, Texas for our General Business Meeting associated with the Society for Integrative and Comparative Biology (SICB) in January 2020 (3-7) where I will be officially handing the baton over to Ingo Wehrtmann (current President-Elect). Our 2020 TCS Mid-Year Meeting will be hosted by our colleagues in South America (Santos City, Brazil) from 27-30 September; so mark those dates on your calendar! The 2021 SICB will be held in Washington, D.C. in January (3-7), with the 2021 TCS Mid-Year Meeting will be organized by our European colleagues from 5-8 July in Paris, France. Phoenix, Arizona will be the venue for the 2022 SICB and the ICC X will then be hosted by our southern hemisphere colleagues in New Zealand (Wellington).

We hope that by having our meetings hosted by countries in different continents, more of our TCS members would be able to make it to at least one of them such that we can be better acquainted. Also, please engage your regional governor on how TCS can make local improvements in your region as well as at our international levels. Our President-Elect, Ingo Wehrtmann, will also be on the lookout for members who would be willing to serve on the TCS Board as our 2019 Elections will be held in the last quarter of this year.

Treasurer's Report for May, 2019

As of April, TCS had 270 renewed members (136 online members, 53 print and online members, 19 patron members, and 62 student members). This number is down from previous years at this time, so please check membership and renew if needed! Please also encourage your colleagues and students to join; particularly students since they are the future of TCS and can take advantage of our research and travel awards.

The Executive Committee of TCS (President Shirley Lim, President-Elect Ingo Wehrtmann, Past-President Brian Tsukimura, Treasurer Jason Williams, Secretary Sarah Gerken, and Program Officer Benny Chan) recently voted to approve the Oxford University Press (OUP) proposed institutional rate increase of 5% for JCB in 2020. In addition, the Executive Committee is reviewing a proposed increase in Author Processing Charges (APC) that is designed to help JCB move in a sustainable direction under increased pressure towards Open Access. Finally, we are monitoring the reduced revenue from page charges at JCB. For 2018, page charges are down by ~\$28K from the previous year (\$46,775 in 2017 and \$18,442 in 2018). This is due, in large part, to authors taking advantage of the guidelines that allow page charges to be waived when at least half of the authors of a manuscript are TCS members at the time of submission. Although OUP profit share for JCB is projected to go up in future years, that may be offset by reduced income from page charges. Thus, the Executive Committee will have to continue examining the impacts on the TCS budget in 2019 and beyond; ultimately, we may need to reconsider current JCB guidelines.

Thankfully, TCS investments continue to do well, with our Schwab accounts totaling approximately US\$584K. The Executive Committee will begin working on the proposed budget for 2020 and I will submit that for the fall issue of the Ecdysiast.


